"Now, here's the thing: building a city? Not bad. Working together? That's great. But their reason? That's where the problem was."

"They weren't building for God. They were building for themselves. This wasn't about faith or trust—it was about pride. About proving they didn't need God. They were saying, 'Look at us! Look what we can do!'"

"And that... is never a good place to be."

"God saw what they were doing. He watched as they stacked the bricks higher, stretching toward the sky. And He knew where this was heading."

"And finally—trust in God's plan. The people of Babel wanted to control their future, to create security on their own terms. But real security? Real peace? That comes from trusting in God, not in our own achievements."

"Here's the best part. Thousands of years after Babel, God will reverse what happened that day. In his kingdom, when it comes, all the world will have one language. God will restore what is broken. and not just language the whole world will be restored to the way it was when he created it. You see through Jesus, God brings people together—not to build a tower, but to build a kingdom."

"So, what are YOU building your life on? Your OWN plans? Your OWN strength? OR are you trusting in God's?"
